Experience timings

If you are bringing two groups, we strongly advise you to book lunches and self-directed time on site unless your groups are arriving and departing from the site separately.

Session timings cannot be changed. There is a fixed 30-minute break between sessions if you are bringing two groups - this allows us to reset the room and resources.

National Curriculum links

History:

- KS2: A local history study
- KS2: A study of an aspect or theme in British history that extends pupils' chronological knowledge beyond 1066

World War 2 Experience outline:

- Introduction to the site and setting the scene to the session and historical period.
- Meet our ARP Warden in the cinema room and learn more about the dangers of war and life on the home front here in Hull. This session is delivered in character to help transform your pupils back to the 1940s.
- Take part in a rotation of three activities as follows:
 - Child evacuation activity – learn why children were evacuated away from Hull. In two smaller groups the children will be required to pack a suitcase with personal belongings and write a label ready to be evacuated.
 - Food rationing activity – discover what foods and non-food items were rationed and the importance of a well-balanced war-time diet.
 - Object handling – handle original artefacts that help your pupils to understand what life was like living on the home front, including the role of the ARP warden and gas attack.
- Rag-rugging activity – the children will have a go at a 'make-do and mend' style activity
- Get on board our 1940s bus and discuss what happened to children who were evacuated out into the countryside.
- Plenary and evaluation.

Important information to help you prepare:

- Rotation of activities – your class will be split into three groups. We recommend that you bring a minimum of three adults per class with you to ensure each group is supported. Adult prompt sheets and information are provided for your adults to help facilitate the activities, whilst our member of staff will navigate around each group.
- Getting onto the 1940s bus – please can adults from your school help the children to get on and off the bus due to it having steep steps.

Key Vocabulary

Blitz, air raid, bombing, evacuee, Billeting Officer, gas masks, rationing, blackout, government, coupons, import, calcium, 'Dig for Victory', Anderson shelter, carbohydrate, vitamins, minerals, protein, dairy, Air Raid Patrol (ARP), incendiary bombs.

Post Visit Activity Suggestions

- Write letters or postcards from the perspective of an evacuee to their family back at home. Your children could include information about their Billeting Officer, host family and what their new surroundings are like.
- Learn and perform songs from the time culminating in a 1940s event at your school.
- Take on the role of the Land Army and 'Dig for Victory' by growing vegetables such as potatoes or carrots. Link with science to develop understanding of what is needed for plants to grow.

- Write a non-chronological report about the Home Front during the Second World War. Your pupils could investigate the key areas that were covered during the experience such as evacuation, rationing, gas attack, the role of the ARP warden and propaganda.



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
