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National Curriculum links

History:

- KS1: Changes within living memory
- KS1: The lives of significant individuals in the past who have contributed to national and international achievements

Amy Johnson Experience outline:

- Introduction to the site and setting the scene to the session and historical period.
- Object handling activity focussing on what life was like in the early 20th century, when Amy Johnson lived handling real and replica objects alongside looking at source material.
- Teacher-led activity Amy's flight learn more about Amy's famous plane, Jason.
- Meet Amy an aspect of this session is delivered in character.
- Help Amy to prepare for her flight identify key items Amy needs to pack to help her on her flight to Australia.
- Learn about Amy's famous flight to Australia and the challenges she faced.
- Plenary and evaluation.

Important information to help you prepare:

- Object handling activity your class will be split into three groups. We recommend that you bring a minimum of three adults per class with you to ensure each group is supported. An adult prompt sheet, information and images are provided for your adults to help facilitate this activity, whilst our member of staff will navigate around each group.
- Our member of staff will briefly leave your class to get into role as Amy Johnson. We ask that you lead a short activity focussed on Amy's plane, *Jason*. All materials and instructions will be provided.

Key Vocabulary

Childhood, education, university, hobbies, flight, flying, aviator, engineer, license, parachute, emergency, journey.

Post Visit Activity Suggestions

- Write a diary entry from the perspective of Amy Johnson during her famous flight to Australia.
- Undertake a comparative study between the United Kingdom and Australia, including the human and physical geography of both countries.
- In science, look at forces and what is required for a plane to fly.
- Create a timeline of developments in flying and flight technology, from Leonardo da Vinci's 15th century flying machines to modern day jets.
